Chairman's Notes

Spring seems to be here and the weeds are waking up and getting ready to overtake the plants - so get working with the hoe.

One of the Council tenancy conditions is that we have to keep plots cultivated and in good order. If not, there is a system of two warnings before we are asked to leave. The standards are not supposed to frighten people off but to make things fair for those on the waiting list and to keep seeding weeds under control. Plot inspections take place about three times a year and the first one will happen soon. I carry out the inspection with another committee member and we aim for fairness. If there are reasons why any tenant is having difficulties in maintaining their plot, they should contact a committee member.

The Council have recently done some road surface repairs at the Grantham Mews entrance of SSO, so I hope it will be firmer and less muddy. Currently the gate is awaiting a new gatepost before being re-installed.

The construction work on the society shed is finally underway on the left-hand edge of SSO going uphill, between B & C roads. The old woodpile on B9 is gradually being sorted, with decent wood being transported and stacked near the site of the new shed, and the rest of it burnt. So, thanks to all who have, and will, help with this project. If you need any lengths of wood, have a look under the tarpaulins at the new site, but please re-cover the pile once you have finished.

Maintaining Paths

You can practically watch the grass grow at the moment! So, this is a reminder that we each have a responsibility to keep paths mown and edged. Also, please make sure to keep stones off the paths, as they can damage mowers.

Oh Deer!

We all love to see the deer roaming free on Ashridge – but it is a different matter when they visit your plot and help themselves to your crops! Last year they had all my broad beans and munched the tops of the potatoes, so I plan not to lose any crops this year. So, what options are there?

We could try growing more – but deer are not very good at sharing so a more practical solution is needed.

The most effective deterrent appears to be a physical barrier. Last year, fallow deer were spotted as well as the more common muntjac - these larger deer are able to jump over many fences, or have the strength to trample over them. The British Deer Society web site gives minimum specification for deer fences as 1.5m high with mesh size 220x200mm for fallow deer and 1.5m high with 75x75mm mesh for muntjac. Erecting this around your plot is a fairly major undertaking, so what else might help?

Some people claim that a radio tuned to a speech channel such as Radio 4 is a useful deterrent - these and other sonic devices are available from various on-line stores, or at Maplins – but there is no evidence of their efficiency. Plastic tape (such as that used by police to rope off incident areas) allowed to flap in the wind also has some effect – it is also very noisy when you are gardening on a windy day! Some chemical repellents have been suggested (e.g. mothballs, scented soap, human urine, human hair) but most of these lose any efficiency after rain. Lion dung – particularly fresh – has been shown to be effective: maybe we should just get a lion!

In conclusion, it would seem that, other than turning your allotment into a high-security fortress, most measures are not guarantees of success but may result in you losing less produce to your invaders.

Tips for Conserving Water on your Plot

As the season warms up and our plants get going, we are going to be out in force, keeping them watered. Water is a precious resource, so let's use it wisely!

- Add organic matter – compost or manure - to your soil, to allow it to store water.
- Mulch round plants: 3-5" will significantly reduce water loss as well as suppressing weed growth. Use wood-chip, bark, grass cuttings, compost, black plastic or strawy manure, mulching after a heavy rainfall.
- Keep on top of weeds, which compete for available moisture, with a hoe. Regular hoeing will ensure a fine dry tilth layer, which will itself act as a mulch and prevent water loss.
- Plant spinach, lettuce and other leafy crops which prefer moist growing conditions in shallow trenches which can be used for watering.
- Do your watering out of the heat of the day; ie in the morning or especially in the evening, so that plants can absorb the water in the soil overnight.
- Sink recycled plastic bottles with their bases cut off near the roots of large, thirsty plants like courgettes, to direct water down to where it's needed.
- Collect rainwater by attaching guttering to your shed or greenhouse and leading to at least one water butt. If you are using water from the tanks, only use a hosepipe to fill water butts, not to spray directly onto the crops.

Keeping your tools safe

Hertfordshire Constabulary will be launching its seasonal crime prevention campaign, Operation Gnome. They remind us to keep our gardens, sheds and allotments secure; to lock our sheds, preferably with two 'hasp and staple' locks (one near the top and one near the bottom of the door). Tools and other gardening equipment should be visibly marked with your postcode and house number - this can deter thieves and help police identify the rightful owner


