Chairman's Notes

Another gardening season is nearly at an end, so we can enjoy eating the fruits of our labours and clear the plots for possible manuring. Before the weather changes, let's cast our minds back to the summer Open Day, which proved so successful, and especially thank Kate Rankin for coordinating all the activities.

During the winter there will be five working party days, so please come along and spend whatever time you can. Thanks to John Goffey for coordinating the work.

Two points from the Council's rules:

If you must have a bonfire, make sure that it is short-lived and hot rather than slow and smoky. Our neighbours have complained, and there is the possibility that the Council will impose more restrictive terms, so let's be careful.

As well as keeping plots cultivated, no rubbish should be brought onto plots. At the end of tenancies, the Council does not wish to be faced with clearing junk, and may choose to recover the costs incurred.

And a reminder that the Society AGM is on **Saturday 18th** January in the Sunnyside Rural Trust premises, Ivy House Lane (near the church car park), so please try to come along and make your views known.

Winter Working Parties 2019-20

Autumn sees the start of the working party season, so once a month on Sundays from October to March (with the exception of December) we will be undertaking communal tasks on a voluntary basis on Sunnyside, both Old and New. The are jobs for which neither individual allotment holders individually nor Berkhamsted Town Council are responsible. For example, the Council are responsible for the wide main green 'roads' and individual plot-holders are responsible for keeping the paths clear between plots. Occasionally a working party may clear paths between un-let plots. or around the wildlife area or the central path on SSN, which is too narrow for the contractor's mower but where regular access is needed to the water tanks.

The wood-chip and leaf piles are also part of SAS communal facilities, and have been abused in the past by contractors dumping. But this year, this has been better controlled by the Council and we hope to use future working parties to clear these areas and extend car-parking facilities on SSO. Hopefully we can do the same on SSN, but the accumulated chip heap (which is riddled with bindweed) is now beyond the scope of a working party. So, we await the Council's intervention there before we can start. Wood -chip will still be available from Sunnyside Rural Trust's chip

This year, we will be looking at the Tea-hut area, finishing off the area around the green shed and workshop, also building a better storage facility for recovered timber. In January, we will be coppicing Jubilee Coppice West (N49) and producing pea and bean sticks available for plotholders' use (a donation to SAS is expected for these, waived for those who joined in the coppicing working par-

Any plot-holder believing they know of work needed that falls into the 'communal' category should bring it to the attention of a member of the Committee.

Sunnyside Tea Hut and Area

Many Sunnyside allotment-holders have long enjoyed the facility we have of the tea-hut and covered seating area, which is found on Plot numbers B15, B17 and B19. Several times during the day (roughly at 11am, 1pm and 3pm, announced by the sounding of a horn) we can meet for a cup of tea or coffee and cake and biscuits, chat about the progress (or otherwise!) of our crops, or simply pass the time of day with friends. This amenity was established some years ago on plots rented by Angela Wheeldon, who has kept the tea-hut tidied and well supplied, and welcomed us all, year in and year out, for a drink and a chat.

However, from 1st October 2019 Angela is relinquishing the top halves of each of these three allotments. The SAS Committee will be taking over responsibility for the top ends of these plots, which house the tea-hut and associated facilities. The middle part of each plot, amounting to about a quarter of a plot each, will be rented out in the usual way.

Over the next few months, the Committee will be deciding how best to upgrade the tea area, for example by installing new roofing to the seating area, and any other suggestions from allotment tenants are welcome.

Please remember that all Sunnyside allotment tenants, whether from Sunnyside Old or New, are welcome to use these facilities: the more the merrier!

King's Seed Orders - a Reminder

Full paid up membership of Sunnyside Allotment Society entitles you to take part in the seed order scheme, which is operated through King's Seeds. This offers seeds and garden sundries at greatly reduced prices. I've recently sent out the catalogues to all tenants who are full members of SAS and asked that order forms are returned to me by 31st October. This is to give me time to collate the orders and send them to King's in time to get an additional discount on our order. This discount is added to Society funds, enabling us to carry out improvements around the site. The King's orders are delivered to my home - seeds in December and potatoes in January, usually, with fruit plants sent direct at the appropriate time. I'll let you know when they arrive, so you can then collect them. Do remember that SAS subscriptions run from January to December, and you need to join before the end of May in order to participate in that year's seed order scheme. The easiest way to pay is at the AGM (which is on January 18th next year) when I will be there to accept payments.
