Dirt is good for you!

Studies show that contact with the soil gives us exposure to beneficial microscopic organisms which perform numerous vital functions in the body, including improving our immune systems.

One theory suggests that we evolved in closer contact with these microbes; that our immune systems developed their ability to fight infections and to tolerate harmless allergens. However, due to overuse of antibiotics, eating pasteurised food, and children spending less time playing outdoors, we are no longer exposed to the same range or quantity of microbes.

So long as good hygiene is observed (washing hands after using the toilet and wearing gloves when gardening, particularly if you have scratches or cuts), exposure to 'good bacteria' from an early age helps to build a healthy 'microbiome'.

So, one more benefit of working your allotment!

Water


In 2022, we used more water than for some years; not surprising considering the weather last summer. The water supply network on both SSO and SSN was improved by the removal of the troublesome float valves, which had an unnerving habit of breaking their (plastic) hinges. Now all 19 tanks have the older all-metal valves, and we have been breakage-free for the entire season. While the Town Council reimbursed us for the valves, their installation was a DIY job by SAS volunteers. In all, we used 758 tonnes of water on SSO and 401 tonnes on SSN between March and the end of October. This was an 87% increase over 2021 and a small (8%) increase over the last very dry summer in 2020.

Winter has been unkind already; in late December the cold snap stretched the ability of our all-season water supply arrangements at the tea hut and the SSO toilet literally to breaking point. The tea hut supply suffered a cracked valve body, but no leak occurred. In the toilet, the supply was turned off, but a small leak occurred when the supply was turned back on. Both items await fixing. Luckily, we can still make water available at the tea hut for Working Party days, and the usual winter arrangements (rainwater and watering can for flushing) can be used at the toilet.

Sunnyside Rural Trust update

At this time of year, coppicing of our willow and hazel on Sunnyside New is carried out by trainees at the Sunnyside Berkhamsted Activity Centre. Some of the willow is then woven around the coppiced hazel rods and made into obelisk plant supports used around the site.

Working parties

While normally working party scope would be limited to the communal areas such as tea hut, car parks, wildlife area, toilet, etc., this year we have extended the scope somewhat to include clearance/improvement work on plots which are proving difficult to let. To bring back into cultivation a plot which has been neglected for a year or more represents a daunting task, and this year we are trying to make B30A and B more 'lettable'. As there is a waiting list for plots, it is in everybody's interest that as many plots as possible on Sunnyside be let.

Many thanks to all those who have volunteered to help on Working Party days; keep up the good work!

The last two working parties will be on Sunday 12th February and Sunday 12th March, from 10.00am. A delicious bread and soup lunch will be provided for volunteers as usual.

Each month, one of them, including herself, has taken responsibility for a weekly clean (in the summer, and fortnightly in the winter). Cynthia is moving away and stepping down from this task, so a big thank-you to her for her reliable management of this key function for SAS over the years.

This means that another co-ordinator is needed urgently. It is not a huge job, just making sure that the people on the rota know which month is theirs, and occasionally getting in new supplies of loo roll and cleaning materials.

Without this work, our toilet would be unusable, so it is really important that someone steps forward! If you can do this, please contact any of the Committee, and I'm sure they will put you in touch with Cynthia to go through the details, if needed.

Mowing of paths

Unbelievably, the grass is still growing with this unseasonable weather, so do remember it is your responsibility to keep paths at the side of your allotment mowed and clear of rubbish. (The council has a contract with a mowing company to do the main roads several times a year).

Wood for use

If you have any construction projects planned, you are welcome to make use of the wood store by the big communal shed at the end of B Road, away from the Church.

It is all covered up to keep the wood dry, so if you uncover it to find what you want, please make sure you have re-covered and secured it. The corrugated iron and scaffolding poles behind the shed are not for general use, but are kept for SAS projects.

Membership of Sunnyside Allotment Society

All plot-holders are members of the Society and receive this quarterly newsletter; however by paying an annual subscription you also become an affiliated member of the National Society of Allotment and Leisure Gardeners (NSALG).

Allotmenters' Liability Insurance

SAS is a member of the NSALG - their website contains a lot of useful information for gardeners (contact Jenny Sippings for the password). Membership of the NSALG now includes allotmenters' liability insurance, so all paid-up members of SAS are covered. This scheme offers £50k liability cover to any member plot-holder accused of accidentally causing injury or damaging property. This cover is well worth the cost of SAS membership in itself.

In addition, SAS members can participate in our autumn group seed-ordering scheme with King's Seeds, which offers considerable savings on the annual cost of seeds, as well as raising money for SAS funds.

The Sunnyside Allotment Society works on your behalf, co-ordinating work to maintain the communal areas of the site and hosting the annual Open Day and other events (when possible!). SAS is also required to report to the Town Council on matters of vacancies and waiting lists, and it represents the interests of tenants at regular Council meetings.

Payment of subscription

I am now inviting payment of your £4.00 Sunnyside Allotment Society subs for 2023. If you wish to be a member this year and be included in the seed order scheme, I need to receive your payment before the end of May. I will be collecting payments at our AGM on 4th February.
