Welcome newbies ...

10 new tenants have joined since the start of 2023. A massive welcome to you all. Jenny and Clive (A13) have years of knowhow so here's their top tips.

Help is at hand ...

Ask for advice and look at other plots around you to get ideas. This will help you plan how you want to organise your plot.

Top to Bottom ...

If you have an open plot start digging from top to bottom, keeping your back to the bit you haven't dug so you don't get discouraged.

Cover up snug ...

If you cannot plant straight away then use tarpaulin to cover your cleared ground as this will help keep weeds away.

You don't need manure ...

In your first year do not order a huge pile of manure. If the plot has been lying fallow for a while it will be fertile enough to start with. You do not need the pressure of trying to dig in large quantities of muck!

Spuds are best ...

Potatoes have a habit of suppressing weeds. This involves digging the soil for planting and then again for harvesting giving you the opportunity to get out more weeds and further break up the soil.

From plot to plate

We are on the look out for good recipes to

share. This time we feature Raspberry Clafoutis.



Ingredients

- Raspberries
 to cover the
 base of a shallow, over-proof
 dish
- 1 pint of milk
- 6 oz plain flour
- 4 oz sugar (keep some back to sprinkle on top)
- 4 eggs
- Vanilla Essence (optional)

Preparation

Step 1 : Lightly grease your dish and cover the base with a layer of raspberries.

Step 2: Put the flour and sugar into a bowl and make a well in the flour mixture, add the eggs and beat in to the mixture.

Step 4: Gradually add the milk and loosen the mixture and then pour this batter over the rasps.

Step 6: Bake in a moderate oven, 375°F, 190°C or gas mark 5 for about 45 minutes to an hour. When cooked the top should be golden brown and the edges rise slightly.

Step 7: Sprinkle sugar over the top to your taste. Hope you enjoy.

Sustainability Survey ...

A student from the Centre for Alternative Technology in Wales has chosen Sunnyside as a base for her research towards an MSc in Sustainability and Ecology.

Berkhamsted resident, Janet Tuppen will be using the site during this spring and summer to carry out surveying as she looks into how to combine land use for food production while at the same time creating sustainable healthy ecosystems.

Of particular interest will be how allotments can benefit wild life and the trade-offs

Did you know

UK allotments are measured in 'rods' or 'poles'. Both have their origins in Anglo-Saxon farming and are the same - one rod or pole is around 25 square metres.

Working winter wonders

For a quarter of a century winter working parties of volunteer tenants have come together to work on communal areas of Sunnyside - and this winter was no different.

No where is the community spirit of Sunnyside more obvious than the tradition of working parties. The idea started 25 years ago when so much of the site - Old and New - were neglected and property developers were looking to swoop. Now a quarter of a century later tenants continue to come together once a month during the winter.

During this winter working parties have focused on the challenges of cutting back the encroaching brambles from the wildlife habitat on B16; removing the decayed hazel tree and its huge roots from B30 and clearing the Millennium

Coppice of years of dead wood and brambles.

That means not only are the areas more accessible but also some vacant overgrown plots are now available to rent - all that is down to the work of those who gave up their Sundays to volunteer.

Thank yous are due to you all including the group of volunteers we had from the Duke of Edinburgh scheme. Thank you also to those who arranged lunches for those attending and of course to John Goffey who takes the overall lead for organising.



Goodbye arising!

Now we are returning to an idea that has been mooted by many before - summer working parties. Our first will be on Sunday 4 June followed by a picnic for all those who take part. So please join us - a lot of hands literally do make light work and any ideas you have for future working parties would be greatly received.

Subs and savings

£200 was added to Society funds last year through the annual round of tenant subscriptions through seed orders. And Treasurer Andy James is keen to remind tenants of the added benefits that their £4 annual subscription can bring. "£4 not only gives you membership of the National Allotment Society and public liability insurance cover but also access to our annual seeds ordering scheme with Kings' Seeds that can bring significant savings for you all". says Andy. Seeds ordered through such schemes are discounted by around 40% according to Kings' Website. Subs must be paid to Andy - not the Council - and must be paid by the end of May. 27 tenants turned out on a cold February morning for the annual general meeting.


All were voted in during a busy Annual General Meeting held in the Sunnyside Rural Trust building and a number of other issues were raised. These ranged from the revamp of the tea hut available for all tenants to use - to the need to explore the possibility of locking gates in order to deter fly-tippers.

There was also a suggestion that new tenants should be asked to pay a deposit on taking over a new plot. This was to deter those who then left their tenancy and their plot in a mess including the need for others to then clear rubbish left behind. This idea has been raised with the Council in the past but rejected. Instead inspections will be stepped up and reports made to the Council for warning letters to be issued.

Three sites - one ticket!

Sunnyside Rural Trust to open all their 3 sites in May for the National Garden Scheme

Sunnyside Rural Trust will open all three of their sites on Saturday 13 May for the National Garden Scheme.

In Northchurch their site is a market garden using "no dig" methods. It includes a nature trail with wildlife pond and a small animal farm. The site in Berkhamsted features a vegetable growing area and a cane and espalier fruit garden with a woodland and hazel coppice - each busy with wildlife. Their 3d site - Hemel Food Garden - is a Green Flag award winning site that is also a plant nursery growing peat free perennial and annual bedding for domestic and commercial clients. There is an orchard, quiet garden space and market garden, growing a wide range of vegetables for their own use.
