From plot to plate

Why not try out our rhubarb chutney recipe.

Ingredients

- 1lb eating apples peeling and finely chopped
- 2oz fresh root ginger grated



- 8oz of dried cranberries or raisins
- 1 tbsp mustard seeds and 1tbsp of curry powder
- 14oz of light muscovado sugar
- 11/2 lb of rhubarb sliced into chunks
- 1lb of red onions, sliced

Preparation

Step 1: put the onions into a large pan with ginger and vinegar, bring to the boil and simmer for 10 mins.

Step 2: add the rest of the ingredients, except the rhubarb, plus 2tsp of salt and bring to the boil, stirring.

Step 3: allow to simmer uncovered for about 10 mins until the apples are tender.

Step 4: stir in the rhubarb and cook uncovered for 15-20 mins until the chutney is thick and jammy. Stir to prevent sticking. Spoon into warm sterilised jars and seal.

Your AGM - have your say



Housekeeping ...

All tenants are reminded to avoid driving on the site "roads" during the wet winter months to avoid damage - or the risk of being stuck in the mud. Please also look out for - and report to the police - any instances you see of fly tipping on the site including the dumping of wood chip. You are also reminded that you are responsible for your own green waste and rubbish and please keep checking your sheds during the winter months.

What £4 buys you ...

Last year the Council decided to increase the number of tenants across the borough who are covered by public liability insurance - and added the £4 subs to annual tenancy bills.

It was a move that was unexpected and unannounced by the Council but it is worth remembering just what the £4 actually buys you.

First of course it is public liability insurance cover. This covers you as a tenant should for instance anyone suffer an injury on your plot caused by anything you have built or left there.

But there is more. The £4 subs also opens up the annual seed ordering scheme for you if you pay - bringing with it savings of up to 40% according to the Kings Seeds website.

So yes it was a shock for most of us - yes it does mean we now lose the voluntary nature of the charge - but what else can £4 buy you these days.

That was the year that was .. 2023!

For some it flashed past before we knew it - yet so much happened across the world in 2023 while here across Sunnyside Allotments we remember when ...

28 tenants joined Sunnyside in 2023 - and at the same time we said goodbye to 33 friends but what else happened across both Old and New in 2023. We look back and capture some the *highlights*.

2023 started with snow on the ground - albeit closely followed by one of the wettest January's many can remember leading to repeated warnings to avoid driving on the *roads* and many examples of cars - and indeed vans - being towed off the site when tenants became stranded.

Never too cold!

Winter is a great time to get ahead of the game in preparation for the new growing season.

Repair and renew!

Check your plot regularly for wind and rain - and even potentially snow damage. Left without attention will only bring more work later in the year.

Plan ahead!

Crop rotation is a great idea to get the best from your plot - and there are some great free apps to help available on the internet.

Stay sharp!

How frustrating to find loppers, secateurs or pruning saws blunt when you need them later in the year. Many charities in Berkhamsted, Tring and Chesham offer repair and sharpening services for a small donation!

Sow a seed or two ...

A time to look at every windowsill you can to sow early cropping veggies in trays - Kale Shoots in a shallow tray for instance could be ready in under 4 weeks while now is a time to sow a layer of pea seeds in a repurposed butter tub.

Forcing rhubarb

If you have rhubarb and it is starting to show signs of life then now is the time to place a forcing cover over the plant to encourage early long tender stems.

With allotments no month is a quiet month!

Order! Order!

For those who placed an order as part of the seed ordering scheme then seeds should now have been picked up from Andy James.

Seed potatoes normally arrive in January and live plants will be sent to tenants directly at the appropriate time.

Kings Seeds, who are affiliated to The National Allotment Society, run the scheme and prices here are about 40% less than the normal price.



Here to Help!

Almost three years on ...

In 2021 Lauren took on A34B so we caught up to find out how she is getting on ...

"I had three plots to choose from when the call came in 2021" says Lauren looking back. "The one we chose was wild and came complete with a random metal shed but we could see potential so in we jumped" she says now sharing the plot with

her mum (Pauline), her partner (Chris) and their young daughter.

"We started small at first. Sweetcorn, onions, French beans, sprouts and some tomatoes - it was our first try



and we felt awesome. Ok so we lost the onions to local wildlife but it is hard to explain how proud I felt to be serving up my own sprouts that Christmas".

"Then our planning kicked in. I recruited my partner Chris to help in levelling the plot and adding raised beds and we replaced our strange metal shed when it blew over in a storm with a brand new wooden version. And now well a 2-foot parsnip as well as pumpkins and turk turbans squash have added to my sense of pride this year."

"But for me it is not all about growing. My 3-year old daughter loves being up there with us and the joy I get from seeing her eating straight from the plants is overwhelming while she loves playing with her own mud kitchen and gardener's set.

"And it is also great to be sharing with my mum. She has a gardening background and is a source of constant help - and if she doesn't know then a growing pile of gardening books is always on hand.

"So that's our first two years. Yes I know that we need to protect our sweetcorn with our lives; and I know that it is all very trial and error at times but its our place - and nowhere better after a stressful week at work.

"Here's to the future - building my knowledge; having fun and seeing my daughter grow into an *allotmenteer* of the future."

Did you know

Spanish allotments - often called "Patios de Invierno" or "Huertas" - are typically the largest plots in the whole of Europe. Each plot can be around 800 metres compared to around 100-200 meters found elsewhere.
