Seed order next steps

31st October was the deadline for seed orders to be with Andy James, our committee treasurer. So what is next? "Seeds normally arrive in December, potatoes in January" says Andy who will contact tenants when their orders have arrived for pick up. "Some items (larger sundries, fruit bushes, asparagus etc) are delivered directly to you by Kings" advises Andy.

Britain's Hedgehogs -help before it's too late!

From around 30 million in the 1970s to just over one million in 2024 - the British hedgehog is in serious decline and your help is needed.

There is no doubt that the native European hedgehog - *Erinaceus Europaeus* - is in serious danger of extinction. In fact according to the British Hedgehog Society this gardeners' friend hasn't been seen in some parts of the UK for some time - and in the South East a recent survey reported less than 500 recorded sightings.

So what has happened to this friendly animal - a natural pest control who would never be seen eating fruits, seed or our brassicas? Well the increase in pesticides - including slug pellets; the increased use of strimmers and the increasing introduction of walls rather than hedges are certain causes. But we can all help.

Create Safe Shelter

Pile logs, sticks or leaves in a quiet corner of your plot - this mimics natural nesting and hibernation sites and avoid disturbing these areas where you can.



Provide "safe" water

Leave a shallow dish of water on your plot and if

you have a pond make sure you provide a ramp or bricks so they can climb out.

Avoid chemicals and hazards

Try to avoid using slug pellets and instead turn to beer traps. Far more humane and many would say far more effective - but make sure you choose a type that is covered rather than open. And lift netting when it is not in use; check composts carefully and definitely lift bonfire piles before setting them alight where you can.

And as for strimmers?

Check long grass before strimming or digging because quite simply strimmers are the No1 accidental injury source.

Berry Beds! Looking after fruit bushes before the winter arrives

Fruit bushes are in abundance across both Sunnyside Old and New so here are a few simple tips for helping them through the winter months.

A quick trim and mulching

Remove any fallen leaves or mummified fruit to reduce the threat of overwintering pests or disease - and mulch up using compost, wood chip or leaves to insulate the roots and provide a steady source of feed.

Currant and gooseberry bushes

Remove crossing, diseased, dead or very old wood and thin out or remove any inward growing wood so that the bush is opened up for light and air.

Raspberries and blueberries

Cut autumn fruiting raspberries down to the ground and for summer fruiting varieties cut down any old wood (ie. where they have fruited this year). Blueberries should only be hard pruned in late winter or early spring.

And definitely don't ...

Don't dump high-nitrogen feed now as this will encourage soft growth which will be damaged by any frost. And don't prune stone fruits (such as plums or cherries trees) in the autumn - do this in the summer to avoid silver leaf and never leave rotted fruit on or below your plants.

A little care now to bring better harvests next year!

From Plot to Plate ..

Here's a simple, seasonal recipe perfect for using up those last few brassicas as we move into autumn - our own Autumn Brassica Stir-Fry with a touch of garlic and lemon.

Ingredients

200g Brussels sprouts, halved; 150g kale torn into bite sized pieces;

150g broccoli florets;

1 small cabbage, shredded;

2 tbsp of olive oil;

2 garlic cloves, minced; 1tsp of lemon zest and the juice of half a lemon;



salt and pepper to taste.

Method

Heat the olive oil in a large pan or wok over a medium heat;

Add garlic and sauté for 1 minute until fragrant;

Toss in the Brussels sprouts and broccoli first and cook for 3-4 minutes;

Add the kale and cabbage and stir-fry for 3-4 minutes until the vegetables are tender but still bright;

Season with salt, pepper, lemon zest, and juice to taste;

Serve immediately (sometimes sprinkled with chilli flakes or toasted nuts.

Add beans or roasted potatoes to complete the dish.

Keep Planting!

Hang on a minute! Why are you all bringing out the tarpaulin and covering your precious beds.

Autumn is a great time to keep planting so here's a few potential winners for you.

Garlic, Onions and Shallots

Sets can be planted now for earlier spring harvests and the both onions and garlics welcome a good frost.

Spinach and winter lettuces

Look for hardy varieties and remember to cover any young seedlings until they are strong enough to thrive winter months.

Do you fancy a radish or two?

Look out for good winter varieties such as "Black Spanish" or "Daikon" and plant before the end of November.

Kale and other winter brassicas

Will usually withstand frost and taste sweeter the colder and frostier it gets.

Don't forget the herbs

Parsley will survive mild winters if mulched and plant chive roots now for early spring growth.

And don't neglect your soil

Green manures like winter rye, vetch or mustard are excellent for improving your soil and preventing erosion.


You see for many October and November is a time to keep going!


News from around the Committee table ..

Furry foodie on the loose

Sightings of ever so cute Glis Glis are increasing on Sunnyside - and gave one tenant quite the fright!

One day in October one of our tenants who will remain anonymous suddenly jumped out of their shed. The shock on their face was evident. We all rushed to help. Sure they had seen little droppings in their shed; for definite they were in the process of clearing their shed out to find out the cause - but what they didn't expect was the little eyes popping out from wood stored above their head.

Yes this was a Glis Glis and it seems more and more of you on

Sunnyside are reporting sightings. And do you know they are in fact a protected species.

You see Glis Glis were actually introduced into the UK by one Lionel Walter Rothschild the British zoologist and

collector who many of you know lived in Tring. The year was 1902 and he introduced them to Tring Park.

Now latest estimates suggest there are around 20,000 to 30,000 in the UK and most are still to be found in the Chiltern Hills. They are nocturnal, excellent climbers, live mostly in woods but love sheds or any dark place.

And what is more they will hibernate up to 7 months at a time - hence the Latin name *glis* which is associated with fattening and sleeping.

Yes they are notorious for chewing - so you definitely don't want them in your loft where one recent Berkhamsted house fire was in fact put down to these little *friends* chewing through wires in the room but it does seem that more and more they are finding Sunnyside just right for their home.

And one shocked allotmenteer will never forget the day! They of course will remain nameless!
